

**SPRING 2019 FIRST YEAR, PART-TIME FLEX PROGRAM SCHEDULE**

The part-time *flex* program is designed to complete the program of legal education in no more than seven years. Ideally, students would complete the program in four, five, or six years.

Part-time *flex* program participants are required to meet with the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs *before registration each semester* to ensure proper and sequential scheduling of classes.

In compliance with ABA Standard 311(b), “A law school shall require that the course of study for the J.D. degree be completed no earlier than 24 months and, except in extraordinary circumstances, no later than 84 months after a student has commenced law study at the law school or a law school from which the school has accepted transfer credit.”

Additionally, ABA Standard 311(c) requires, “A law school shall not permit a student to be enrolled at any time in coursework that exceeds 20 percent of the total credit hours required by that school for graduation.”
