Include a reference list (APA or MLA format).

B. Proposed Project Description (300–500 words)

Describe the project your team will carry out. Please include:

- **Objectives:** What do you hope to achieve?
- Activities: What steps will you take, and on what timeline?
- Roles: Who on your team is responsible for each part?
- Alignment: How does your project connect to LMU's mission and values?
- **Evaluation:** How will you measure success (surveys, participation rates, testimonials, outcomes, etc.)?

Why we ask this: A strong plan shows that you know where you're going, how you'll get there, and how you'll know you've succeeded.

C. Sustainability & Growth (Optional but Recommended) (150-200 words)

If this project is successful, could it continue beyond the award semester? Could it grow into something larger (e.g., with other funding, as a club initiative, or by training others)?

Why we ask this: Funders love to see projects that inspire long-term change. Even a short idea about sustainability makes your proposal stronger.
