Ms. Lee has been an Assistant Professor of Social Work and Field Coordinator at LMU since 2018. She is currently a Doctoral Student at Walden University, pursuing her Ph.D. in Social Work Administration. Her dissertation topic is Food Insecurity among At-risk Seniors in the Appalachian Region of Southwest Virginia. Ms. Lee holds a Licensed Master Social Work (LMSW) license in Tennessee and Virginia. Ms. Lee is pursuing her Tennessee clinical licensure (LCSW), in collaboration with the University of Tennessee-NOW Grant (Nurturing Options for Women) and Servolution Health Services. As a part of the grant, Ms. Lee is providing behavioral health services to the uninsured community affected by substance use disorder and other mental health diagnoses as a part of her clinical licensure requirements.

Ms. Lee maintains licensure requirements by completing a minimum of 15 hours of CEU credits per year, to include Ethical Practice, and Suicide Prevention, among other topics. Ms. Lee is currently pursuing her clinical license that requires 3,000 hours of client clinical contact/100 hours of supervision/over a period of no less than 2 years.
